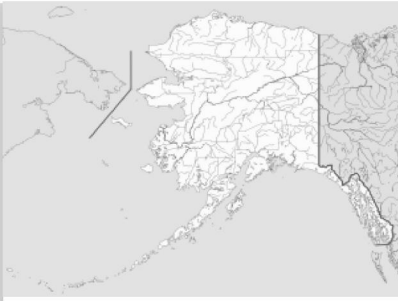

Alaska's legislators and top executive-branch officials will receive pay increases by 2024

The state House and Senate failed to pass a bill that would have blocked the pay hikes from coming into effect

Alaska legislators, Gov. Mike Dunleavy, Lt. Gov. Nancy Dahlstrom and the commissioners in charge of state agencies will see pay raises after the Legislature missed the final deadline for a bill needed to block the increases.

Starting July 1, Alaska's governor will be paid approximately \$176,000 per year, the lieutenant governor about \$140,000, and commissioners will receive about \$168,000 per year.

Legislators will be paid \$84,000 per year, up from \$50,400, starting next January.

The increases are the result of a convoluted series of events that saw Dunleavy, Speaker of the House Cathy Tilton and Senate President Gary Stevens wholly replace a salary-setting commission.

With limited public notice, the five new commissioners approved a new pay plan that awarded raises to legislators and top members of the executive branch.

Legislators blocked a pay proposal from the prior members of the commission and could have stopped this new pay hike too, but key members of the Senate were in favor of the pay increase, and House lawmakers stalled on the bill needed to disapprove the increase.

Monday was the deadline to pass the disapproval bill through the House and Senate, and on Tuesday, members of the House took a performative vote, advancing the bill on a 33-7 vote.

Rep. Craig Johnson, R-Anchorage and chair of the House Rules Committee, scolded members of the House, saying that the bill could have advanced to a vote as early as March, but lawmakers weren't willing to sign a "chit sheet" affirming their support for the bill.

"Roughly half this body said, I'm not signing it," Johnson said, explaining why the bill didn't advance to a final vote sooner.

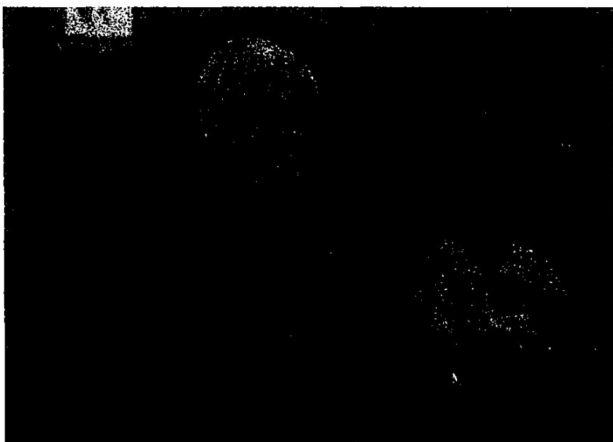
Legislators needed only three days to pass a similar disapproval bill through both House and Senate in 2022. That bill would have cut total legislative compensation rather than increase it.

On Tuesday, legislators said this year's pay increase is difficult to defend.

"We're going to have a lot of explaining to do. That's a really high pay raise," said Rep. Alyse Galvin, I-Anchorage.

Several members of the House said that it makes little sense to increase legislative salaries in a year when the Legislature has gone through all but one day of the session without approving a state budget.

"For my conscience, I have to at least make a statement -- cut the PFD, shut down the government, give me a raise -- it just doesn't sit well," Johnson said.

Reps. Zack Fields, D-Anchorage, and George Rauscher, R-Sutton, were among a small but vocal minority of House members who said the pay increase is warranted -- not because of actions this year, but

because legislative pay has failed to keep up with duties and inflation. "It may be an unpopular position ... but I'll make the argument because it's the right argument," Fields said.

At its current level, legislative pay "makes it impossible for working-class parents to serve," he said.

There hadn't been any salary increases since 2011, but the new increase for legislators exceeds the amount of inflation since then.

Legislators are required to maintain a household in their home district and must pay for accommodations in Juneau during the legislative session.

Legislators receive per diem expense payments -- those typically add up to more than \$30,000 per year on top of salary -- but some members of the House said that doesn't fully compensate for the cost of living.

Rauscher said his take-home pay works out to \$39,000 per year, and that means only wealthy people can afford to serve in the Legislature.

"I don't think just retired people with another retirement (income) should be able to sit here in my seat because they can afford to do what I'm doing," he said.

Even if the bill disapproving pay increases had passed the House earlier this year, it's doubtful that it would have passed the state Senate.

"I think it's a fair salary," said Senate President Gary Stevens, R-Kodiak. "You know, we are dealing with billions of dollars. And I think we want to attract people who may not want to leave the job they have. I think the salary increase may make it more possible for many people to serve in the Legislature."

Stevens' perspective appears to be backed by a majority of the Senate, as evinced by a budget vote Monday.

Though they've come into effect, the higher pay rates are still subject to the Legislature's willingness to take money from the state treasury to pay for them.

Sen. Mike Shower, R-Wasilla, proposed on Monday to cut the additions from the state budget.

"This is a significant increase, and I can't justify going home and explaining that to the folks at home with how things are going economically," Shower said.

Shower's proposal was defeated, 13-7.

New Jersey lawmakers eyeing big pay raises for themselves

Lawmaker pay would rise from \$49,000 to \$82,000 under new bill

Committees in both chambers of the Legislature approved what would be the first salary hikes for their members in more than two decades on Thursday, and even amended the bill at the last minute to afford themselves even larger salaries than initially proposed.

The bill, approved in party-line votes, would raise lawmakers' \$49,000 salary to \$82,000 in 2026 – up from \$75,000 in a previous version of the bill – and would raise pay for a host of other state employees, including the next governor. The measure's chief sponsor said it is a bid to keep talented officials in the public sector.

“These problems are not just about quality of life, they are about quality of government,” said Sen. Dick Codey (D-Essex), the sponsor. “If New Jersey cannot pay its workers enough to compete with the private sector, and as a consequence we fail to retain our most talented public servants, it is the people of New Jersey who will face the consequences.”

The Senate president and Assembly speaker would see slightly higher salaries than their colleagues, about \$109,000.

The bill is moving quickly toward passage. It was introduced on Tuesday and is scheduled for a floor vote in the Senate Monday.

Thursday’s amendments removed provisions that would have indexed legislator salaries to inflation beginning in 2028, to an annual cap of 2%. The amended bill does not index lawmakers’ salaries.

Other provisions would raise legislators’ staff allowance from \$135,000 to \$150,000, while salary caps for executive directors of each caucus and members of Gov. Phil Murphy’s cabinet would increase from \$175,000 to \$210,000.

Those raises would take effect in 2024. Thursday’s amendments removed provisions that would have made the increases to top staff retroactive through July 2023.

The bill would also increase the governor’s salary from \$175,000 to \$210,000, but that increase would only take effect once Murphy’s successor is inaugurated in early 2026.

Republican and Democratic lawmakers on the Assembly Appropriations Committee butted heads over the legislation, with the GOP lawmakers charging the bill would drive legislative salaries too high.

“There’s legitimately nobody who believes that we should be paid \$82,000. I can assure you no sane person thinks this is logical,” said Assemblyman Brian Bergen (R-Morris). “We don’t deserve it. This is a part-time job.”

Legislators can pay for some expenses, like gas mileage, using funds from their campaign accounts, Bergen said. State law allows candidates and officeholders to reimburse mileage expenses for campaign and officeholding travel.

Some Democratic lawmakers noted higher salaries for legislators could expand opportunities to more New Jerseyans. At present, the state’s part-time Legislature is filled primarily by lawyers, business owners, county officials, and others with flexible scheduling.

“I don’t think passing these raises is ever easy, but I would like to see us diversify what we do,” said Assemblywoman Eliana Pintor Marin (D-Essex).

The bill received no public testimony and saw scant discussion before the Senate’s budget committee.

The bill would also extend salary adjustments for a range of judicial officials. Judicial salaries are indexed for inflation, to an annual cap of 2%, but the adjustment to be calculated this December would be the last under existing law. The bill would extend those adjustments for another two years, with the final adjustment calculated in December 2026 and taking effect the following January.

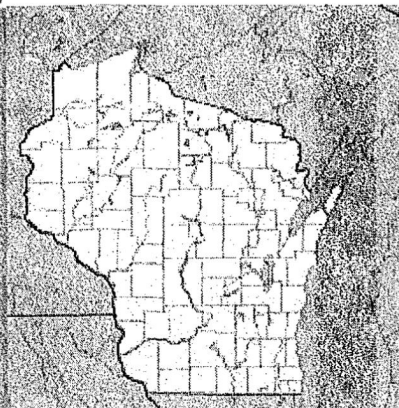

Pivot Counties (2016)

Ballotpedia identified 206 counties that voted for Donald Trump (R) in 2016 after voting for Barack Obama (D) in 2008 and 2012. Collectively, Trump won these **Pivot Counties** by more than 580,000 votes. Of these 206 counties, 23 are located in Wisconsin, accounting for 11.17 percent of the total pivot counties.^[4]

Pivot Counties (2020)

In 2020, Ballotpedia re-examined the 206 Pivot Counties to view their voting patterns following that year's presidential election. Ballotpedia defined those won by Trump as Retained Pivot Counties and those won by Joe Biden (D) as Boomerang Pivot Counties. Nationwide, there were 181 Retained Pivot Counties and 25 Boomerang Pivot Counties. Wisconsin had 21 Retained Pivot Counties and two Boomerang Pivot Counties, accounting for 11.60 and 8.00 percent of all Retained and Boomerang Pivot Counties, respectively.

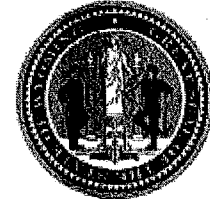

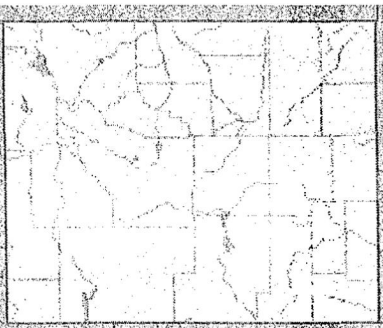
